EXPECTED RESPONSES & MARKING GUIDELINES

This question is based on "Side Effects" by The Chainsmokers feat. Emily Warren. It will be played for you six times to answer the question. (Excerpt 0:00-1:05)

Outline the roles of the SOUND SOURCES in this excerpt.

8 marks

Better responses will:

Provide a well organised response that identifies the sound sources, outline their roles and reference a range of concepts. Demonstrate a high level of aural awareness, accurately describing compositional techniques while providing relevant examples to support the statements. Use traditional or graphic notation accurately when necessary.

Weaker responses may:

Provide an unbalanced or, disorganised answer that may incorrectly identify sound sources. Lack evidence of understanding of the different roles. Make inaccurate observations of musical events and techniques or fail to identify them. Fail to provide appropriate examples to support statements.

Responses MAY include:

Intro

Two synth sounds crescendo to bring in first chord of verse. One is a second above the tonic note of the key, the other is a descending, sweeping percussive sound.

Verse 1

Repeated chord progression in a minor key. Bass guitar outlines the harmony with a syncopated bass line and the kick plays on all four beats, creating a strong, driving rhythm. Some synthesised percussion is heard at the end of the 4th bar. A female vocal sings the melody which is broken into a long phrase, followed by two shorter phrases across four bars, then repeated.

Pre chorus 1

The accompanying instruments of the verse are replaced with a piano playing semibreve chords on the first beat of the bar and an electric guitar with a delay effect playing on the offbeat. Still in a minor key but it finishes with a major chord. The same synthesised sounds heard in the intro, lead into the chorus.

Chorus

Dense texture due to all previous instrumentation re-entering. Addition of various percussive sounds such as claps create rhythmic interest.

Verse 2

Similar to Verse 1 but snare plays on beats 2 & 4 with some hi hats and claps to create rhythmic interest. This verse is half the length of the first

Pre chorus 2

Repeat of Pre chorus 1 but synth provides harmonic material and kick drum on beats 1 & 2, as well as some hi hats, maintain momentum towards next chorus.
